GPP Single Delivery Plan



- Overview of Peterborough
- 2001 census population C.171,000
- 25% under 19
- 62% working age
- 13% over 65
- 2011 census - expect significant change, particularly from inward migration.
- Over 100 languages spoken in schools

GPP Single Delivery Plan



- Census figures expected July 2012 onwards
- Current guestimate population: 173,420?
- GP registration: 181,327 (2011)
- New NI registration (overseas adults)
- 2002-2011 adds up to 35,020 (no information about exit).
- Millfield Medical Centre
- 2000 patients registered in 2002
- 10,000+ patients registered in 2012



Births

- Ten years ago about 3000 births per year
- 2010 4505 births
- 2011 4719 births

September is the peak!

Deaths

- 2010 2124 deaths
- 2011 2072 deaths

•How?

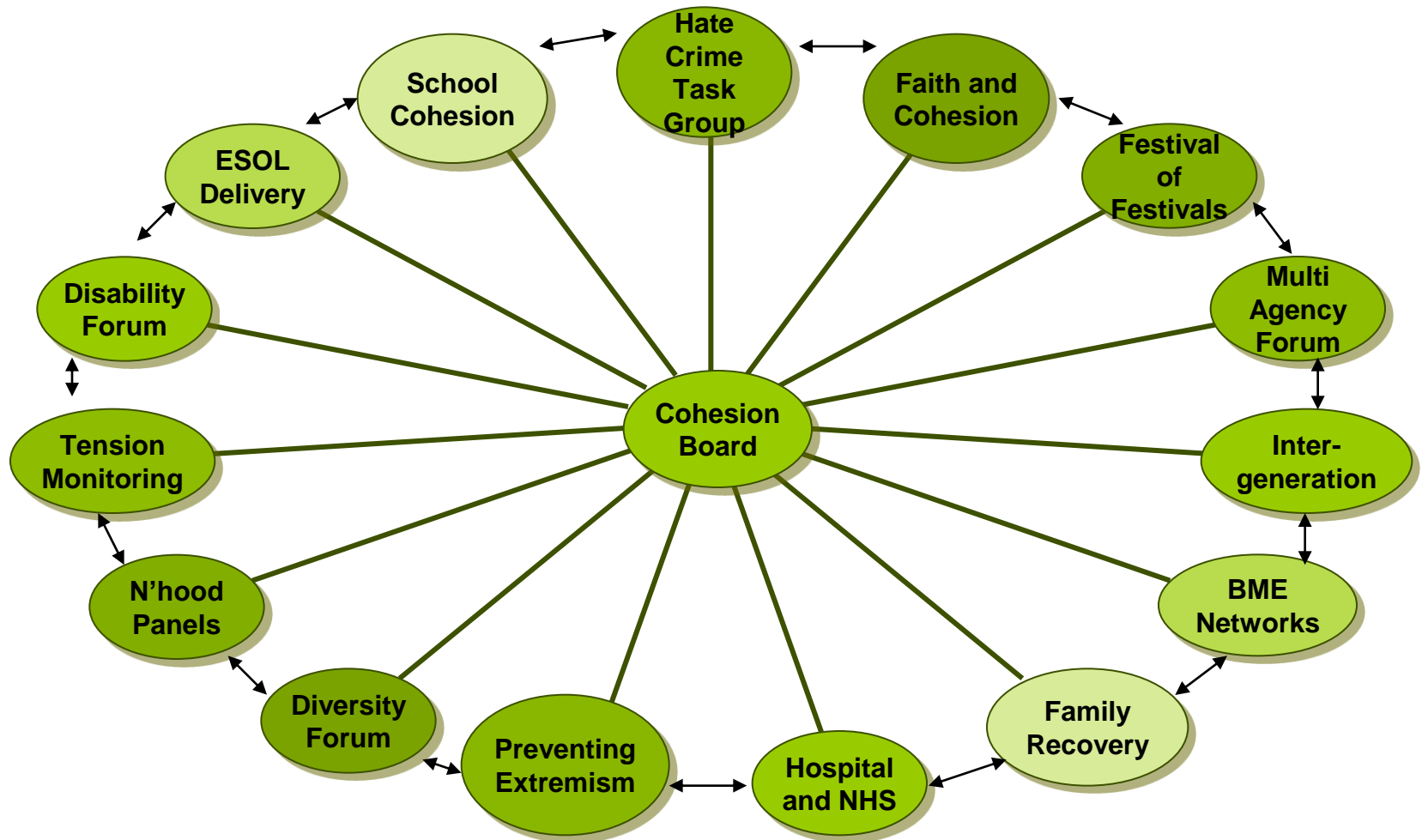
Multi agency partnership between public and voluntary/community sector to understand community needs and tensions.

- Works in partnership with the Cabinet, statutory partners, voluntary and community sector and business sector.
- Takes a strategic look at the cohesion issues facing the city
- Provides the direction to improve cohesion
- Internal scrutiny of projects

- Four Priorities
- Three Themed Cohesion Action Plan



3 Key Priorities

- Reducing Community Tensions
- Engaging young people through raising aspirations (including 19 to 24)
- Engaging and empowering communities through improved access and take up of neighbourhood services.



Some highlights of key milestones

- ESOL Project aimed to support parents to better engage in their children's education.
- Providing support to most vulnerable groups e.g. disabled groups, young people, faith communities
- Tackling tensions through closer engagement with different community groups and partners.
E.g. National Disorder August 2011 implications.



Future Challenges

- Growth: Significant population increase predicted. How to build new communities/infrastructure and integrate with existing communities?
- Financial: Dwindling funding and resources among all partners to support communities. How can we do even more with even less?
- Young people: Perceived lack of future for some can lead to tensions and “nothing to lose” attitude. How can we engage, support and protect young people?
